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Editorial



Moto Camping: The Lessons Carry On When we started packing for our RTW ride, one of the first things we put on the floor next to our clothes, motorcycle gear and cameras, was the camping equipment. Making the decision on what tent to buy, what sleeping bags and

mats or what gadgets we should carry wasn't an easy task. There's too much information out there and sometimes its abundance can be as confusing as it is helpful. Since that day back in 2013 we have come a long way, learned a few things and

have made adjustments, not only regarding our equipment but mainly regarding the expectations and realities about camping on a long-term bike trip.

The source of knowledge is experience, and this was the case for us. From the absolutely amazing, yet terrifying, first night of wild camping in the Western Sahara, to the sleepless night at an organized campsite somewhere in Brazil thanks to partiers, almost every camping experience can be described by one word: unpredictable! Although unpredictability is the heart of adventure, being as well-prepared as possible is key to enjoying the ride and avoiding nasty surprises. Read more

loved my husband, Hal Robinson. I loved his drawings also, and I loved him because he was a great human being. Read more




World War II Rider Beatrice Shilling, OBE.

With a simple, thimble-shaped washer, this pioneering woman gearhead saved the lives of countless RAF pilots in WWII. During the Battle of Britain, the Royal Air Force discovered a glaring problem with its Rolls-Royce Merlin-powered fighters—the Hawker Hurricane and the Supermarine

Spitfire. See, that generation of Merlin was fitted with dual-choke, updraft carburetors built by the S.U. Carburettor Company Limited. These worked just like your regular updraft carb and were great in level flight. Problem was, you see, that fighter planes don't spend a lot of time in level flight. Read more

Kawasaki Continues Tilting Three-wheeler Development. More than two years ago in January 2021, we revealed <u>Kawasaki</u>'s designs for a <u>leaning three-wheeled</u> <u>motorcycle</u> with a simplified suspension and steering system compared to its rivals. Now additional patent applications



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have been filed indicating that the project remains alive—even if some of the benefits of the original design appear to have been lost in the latest iteration. Read more

Wave goodbye to forgotten blinkers: UK biker invents indicator alarm system A retired electrical engineer has developed a one-size-fits-all indicator alarm for the inevitable times we sail down the road blissfully unaware the orange bulb is blinking –

and is looking for investors to come on board. Joe Cowell's invention differs from the few indicator alert systems already on the market in that it does not rely on a Bluetooth communications device to alert the rider, nor does it require a direct attachment with the battery for power. Instead the Eskaz device wires straight into the indicators and a 90dB alarm, contained in a waterproof box, is attached to the handlebars or suitable mount. Read more

Take the plunge with James Toseland for charity. Two-time World Superbike Champion James Toseland will abseil down the 160ft Owen Building at Sheffield Hallam University this weekend to raise awareness for The



Children's Hospital Charity – and you could join him. There are still places left for the abseil with James on Sunday, March 19, who will be taking the plunge in his motorcycle leathers. Fundraisers are required to pay a non-refundable £24 deposit to secure their place, which covers the cost of the abseil, with a promise to raise a minimum of £100 to support Sheffield Children's. 
South Yorkshire Safer Roads Partnership

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY: Do you know which side of the road you should walk on if there is no pavement? Keep to the right-hand side so that you can see oncoming traffic. Take extra care and be prepared to walk in single file, especially on narrow roads or in poor light. #HighwayCode







HIGHWAY CODE RULE 3: Help other road users to see you. Wear/carry something light-coloured, bright or fluorescent in poor daylight conditions. When dark, use reflective materials which drivers using headlights can see

up to 3 times as far away as non-reflective items. @rotherhamcouncil

PEDESTRIANS AND JUNCTIONS: When you are crossing or waiting to cross the road at a junction, other traffic should give way. Look out for traffic turning into the road, especially from behind & cross at a place where drivers can see you:





BRIGHT IDEAS: What type of clothing is best for active travel during darker conditions? Reflective or high-vis? Or both? FIND OUT

Whatever the conditions, motorists must be vigilant & look out for more vulnerable road users to reduce the chances of a collision. ♥

Hurt stated:

LAST WEEK'S ROUND-UP

*** SKILLS ON SATURDAY *** Quick-n-Easy #1 STANDARD BRAKING Right now I'm in New Zealand working on the Shiny Side Up events talking about how to get 'our head in the game' and be more alert to two of the most common crashes of all -collisions at intersections and the rider-only error that leads to a bend crash. Ideally we'll see the problem developing - which is why I have been talking about 'Situational Awareness' but eventually we get to the point where we may need to take some evasive action. As New Zealand moves towards autumn, it's never too late to build up these skills ready for next year, but in the UK spring should be just around the corner, so it's an equally good time to look at the first of three skills: braking. Read more



*** MYTHS ON MONDAY *** ABS isn't as good as a good rider. Though riders in the UK are now far more likely to accept

Anti-lock Braking Systems as the norm for a modern bike and are even seeing the most advanced cornering ABS as a desirable feature to have on the machine, it's only in the last couple of years that ABS has been mandated on new machines in New Zealand, and hence riders here are still at the beginning of the discovery process. *** TIPS ON TUESDAY *** Hazards and how to understand them Pt 2. Last week I defined what we actually mean when we talk about hazards and you'll recall I defined a hazard in the road safety sense as anything that could pose a threat to our personal well-being, meaning that to



avoid it we need to change speed or direction. I also explained



*** SHINY SIDE UP *** Over for another year. It's been a strange trip. After starting the tour via Zoom from London, then landing in the middle of the cyclone to find our connecting flight

cancelled, waking up next day to all the disruption which caused the cancellation of two of the North Island events, and being unable to get to the South Island for the next two events at the beginning of the tour, we finally finished with a rush. Read more

*** SKILLS ON SATURDAY *** Smoothing the brake / throttle transition. One of the skills I've noticed even experienced riders can sometimes lack - and it's a really common problem with new riders - is dealing with the transition from brakes to gas. Why? We riders are in too much of a hurry. We're



not on a race track and gaining a fraction of a second by rushing the switch from braking to accelerating is totally unnecessary. Read more



*** MYTHS ON MONDAY *** Dealer wants a National Insurance number for the test ride. A couple of years ago. I'd spotted the local Yamaha dealer had a Niken, Yamaha were saying that they were all available for test rides, and so I wandered in and asked if

I could set up a couple of hours ride on the bike. "Sure", I was told, "just bring your licence, passport and National Insurance number and we'll sort you out". Read more




Did you know that speed kills and injures 54 young people every week? THINK Road Safety is running a speeding campaign to help raise awareness about the risks of driving too fast for the conditions
