Sure, you can store your bike over winter and suffer through bouts of riding-itch. Or you could follow our guide and keep riding in the cold like an absolute pro!

One need not cross the Caucasus Mountains in far-eastern Europe at the height of winter to suffer the hellish pits of motorcycle riding in



cold weather. Staying warm and toasty whilst riding is just as important on a daylong stint near home as it is when tackling a cross-continental journey. If you don't have the right cold weather motorcycle riding gear on, you'll freeze just the same.Read more



It goes without saying that most of us replace the stock exhaust systems of our motorcycles in order to enhance the engine sound our bikes produce. Of course, along with this improved sound comes marginal power gains, especially

if the engine is tuned to accommodate the exhaust, as well as quite a lot of weight reduction.

As with most things related to modifying motorcycles, there are two routes to take when it comes to "upgrading" your exhaust. On the one hand, you can do a hack job by cutting off the muffler and cat, as well as any emissions regulations conformity in the process. The same goes for purchasing a knock-off exhaust system online. On the other hand, you can go for the legal approach and purchase a certified exhaust system from a reputable manufacturer – something that's pretty much your only choice if you live in Europe, as rules surrounding aftermarket exhausts are much stricter over there. 

National Highways: North-East is creating 12 new emergency stopping areas on the M1 between junction 32 at Thurcroft & junction 35A at Stocksbridge.





example. I found one retrospective review referring to it as a charming retro-style machine, but truth be told, it's one of the least-appealing bikes I've ever ridden. Read more






