IAM RoadSmart Annual General Meeting

It was the IAM's AGM yesterday. They reported a £1.7m loss for the year 2022/2023. This was accounted for by losses in volatile investment markets and restructuring costs. They have a 3-year development plan with members at the heart of delivering services. Engaging with the membership has been less than satisfactory in the past and they are determined to correct the situation. This work has already begun with visits to Groups and Regional Forums. The current membership is 74,795, falling steadily from 85,752 five years ago. The meeting voted for the 8.3% Membership fees. It's an increase of £4/year for members paying by direct debit. Issues from Groups such as payments to motorcycle observers and recruiting younger members will be followed up by the CEO.



How to: Motorcycle Braking

It may seem like voodoo, but good braking skills aren't hard to develop.

When you're first learning to ride, coordinating a motorcycle's throttle,

clutch, shifter, front brake, and rear brake can seem like a confounding task – and especially doing so smoothly. Fortunately, though, if you're already a bicycle rider, the clutch and front brake levers will seem natural enough. (Until, of course, you notice that a bicycle's front brake lever is on the left and the front brake lever on a motorcycle is on the right...but that's a mystery we shall not address here.) Instead, let's just discuss brakes and braking. Read more

My first motorcycle was a 1980 Honda CM400E. It wasn't fast, and the brakes were lousy, but it delivered some memorable rides. One ride was notably short, but it made a lasting impact on a special family friend.



Raymond was the younger brother of my father's close friend and colleague. It was challenging for Raymond to communicate with words, but there was one message he always conveyed with crystal clarity: He loved motorcycles. Read more



It came to me in the middle of the night, as most great ideas do: I would take an India motorcycle trip, crossing from north to south. My route would take me from the mountains of Ladakh to the valleys of Kashmir, into bustling Rajasthan, over the Western Ghats, and

through the wet jungles of the South – a total distance of more than 4,500 miles. I would ride "Ullu," my 2009 Royal Enfield Machismo 350 with an ongoing tappet issue, and my budget would be only 30,000 rupees (about \$360). Read more Ellie Cooper

IS THIS MOTORCYCLE CURSED? A BSA B50 STORY

I had wanted a BSA B50 for many years. They were the final distillation of BSA's unit singles that won World MX Grand Prix championships with Jeff



Smith in the 1960s and were the last competitive factory four stroke MX bikes in the early 1970s. CCM and Cheney built special

framed purpose-built racers around the B50 engine that kept them competitive into the mid and late 1970s. The B50 also had the weirdest and one of the most beautifully shaped alloy gas tanks ever conceived for a motorcycle. It wasn't exactly round but it wasn't rectangular either. It was dubbed the lozenge. Triumphs had Pear shaped tanks and Harley had Tear Dropped tanks, BSA came out with a cough-drop shaped tank. The B50 was also recognized as one of the last great British singles in a long line of bikes that stretched back to the early teens and twenties. British singles won Grand Prix Championships with great riders like Geoff Duke and John Surtees. Names like Comet, Manx, Goldstar, Venom, Thruxton and Victor were all great British singles. The B50 also performed admirably in road racing and endurance racing, often bettering larger displacement bikes. I wanted a piece of that heritage. Read more

'Highway 35': a story of triumph over adversity, by Chris and Denise Arthey

In 2008, while on a work assignment in the USA, Chris and his wife Denise were exploring

Texas on a motorbike when a crash instantly changed their lives. It resulted in them both losing their left leg above the knee, and they found themselves embarking on the road to recovery—a long and painful one. Chris shares their story with IAM Roadsmart.

Motorcycles make up 3.5% of all licenced vehicle types, yet riders represent a fifth (21%) of all fatalities and 2.5% of all casualties.

We have created a petition to scrap VAT on life-saving motorcycle air vests, arguing that they should be treated



as other essential life-saving equipment which are zero or lower VAT.
